SLOW COOKING FOR SUCCESS

The Food Team have recently delivered their popular 'Winter Warmer' slow cooker course to over 200 households in the Tees Valley area. Funded by Middlesbrough Community Learning, the people attending these courses enjoy a practical cooking session covering how to prepare nutritious meals whilst saving on their energy bills. On completion of the course, they received a slow cooker to take home to help them put what they have learned into practice.

MEC have been awarded a grant from Irwin Mitchel Charities Foundation part of which will be used to build upon the success of these courses and fund the delivery of further practical cooking sessions on using a slow cooker to groups in Middlesbrough.

TURNING UP THE HEAT WITH AFFORDABLE WARMTH

Over the last 12 months, the amazing Affordable Warmth team have attended 48 community events across the Middlesbrough and Redcar & Cleveland area reaching hundreds of individuals who received advice, thermometer info cards and free lightbulbs! On top of this, the team have supported 1,975 households with fuel vouchers through our referral process.

Since October, our Affordable Warmth team have been working closely with Redcar Borough Council's Health Improvement Team and Northern Gas Network, as part of the Warm and Healthy children project, in partnership with The Yorkshire Energy Doctor. The funding from this project has allowed the team to support vulnerable households in the Redcar & Cleveland area with warm packs which are small, but very effective energy efficient measures, that the team has put together to help in preparation for our next winter. They have provided 77 households with these packs, and counting!



The team have also attended a number of events across the wider region, including:

- Lazenby Village Hall 'Cost of living Crisis' Community Drop-In session - 23 individuals engaged the affordable warmth/cost of living crisis drop in held at Lazenby Village Hall warm space.
- Guisborough Bridge/Methodist Church 'Cost of Living Crisis' Community Drop in session – Over 50 individuals engaged with MECC conversations, benefit checks i.e. pension credit, council tax support etc. affordable warmth advice.
- Skinningrove 'Cost of living Crisis' Community Drop in session - Local residents were able to seek advice, guidance and support from professionals and services. A total of six warm home packs were issued to pensioners who attended the drop in.
- March 2023 Triage event Around 200 people attended this event,with over 20 other organisations attending as well.
