CAM WELCOMES MOVING BEYOND AT MEC

This month, CAM welcomed delegates from the Moving Beyond conference – held this year in Stockton's watersports centre overlooking the river Tees. Moving Beyond is an initiative that brings together businesses, investors, government, and society to accelerate the UK's response to climate change and build a more sustainable way of life.

MEC and other CAM partners presented an overview of the work. The visitors learned about CAM's Climate Action Clubs – our informal offer for primary school-aged children where we engage them with climate action in a fun and practical way. They found out about our more formal lessons and how we get schools on board. Asylum Seeker and Refugee community engagement was the next topic, including how to find a balance between the importance of climate action and the often challenging journey that new citizens face.

But maybe the highlight – or certainly the part that raised the most laughs, was when we got the delegates on our smoothie bike! We talked about how we use the bike simply to get people talking to us, and then shift the conversation to energy use..."would you make a smoothie every morning if you couldn't just flick a switch? How much electricity does flicking that switch take? Where does that energy come from? What impact does that have on the climate?". We've found the bike to be a great opener and lots of engagement happens as people pedal.

We finished off the day with a tour and talked about how CAM will link in with a new MEC project, which will be based on our allotment on the MEC site. Feedback was great, and really humbling, with one candidate telling us it was "one of the best 90 minutes [they've] spent this year"!
